WILDLAND FIREFIGHTER TRAINING

New Wildland Firefighter

If you have an interest in becoming a Wildland Firefighter and are 18 years of age or older, this is your path to getting trained and signed up. A wildland firefighter must adhere to certain physical standards and pass several online courses. Additional paperwork will need to be completed that will allow you to be hired, drive a fire apparatus vehicle, and get paid. This is a physically demanding profession. But can also be very rewarding. These are temporary/emergency firefighter positions with no guarantees of placement or duration. When opportunities arise, you will have opportunities to travel with a Fire Crew nationwide to assist with Fire Suppression. This list of courses and tasks will take significant time to complete(40 hours). All certificates of achievement and other completed documents must be emailed as a single packet to ProTemps, INC.

1: Obtain your FEMA ID

To access the training, you'll need a FEMA ID. This ID is your key to participating in the courses. The best part? It's entirely free! Your FEMA ID not only enables you to take part in the training but also allows you to track your courses and maintain a record of the classes you've completed.

2: Set up a student account with NFA online

After obtaining your FEMA ID, you will need to create your student account on the main learning page to access all the classes you need. This account is your key to federal training programs. The website you'll be directed to is your main workspace for completing the vital classes needed to become a certified wildland firefighter.

Great, now that your account is set up, it's time to embark on your wildland firefighting journey.

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The following crucial classes are mandatory:

- S-110: Basic Wildland Fire Orientation
- S-190: Introduction to Wildland Fire Behavior
- S-130: Firefighter Training
- L-180: Human Factors in the Wildland Fire Service
- IS-100 (ICS-100)
- IS-700 (ICS-700)

These classes form the foundation of your training, covering key aspects of wildland firefighting.

3: Submit your certifications

Congratulations on completing all the mandatory classes! Now, let's wrap up the process with a few essential steps:

Send in Your Certificates: Once you've successfully finished the courses, ensure to send in your certificates. Please consolidate and send all your information to the following email address in a single email: 20dominicrogerspe01@gmail.com

To submit your certification documents, follow these requirements for the email submission:

1. Attach Certificates: Attach the certificates for the following completed courses: ○ S-110:

Basic Wildland Fire Orientation

- S-190: Introduction to Wildland Fire Behavior
- S-130: Firefighter Training
- L-180: Human Factors in the Wildland Fire Service
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2. Include New Employee Form: Ensure that the New Employee Form is filled out and

attached to the email.

3. Provide Contact Information: Include your phone number and full name in the body of the email.

please note that upon completion of any FEMA course, you may not be able to print off the certificate for 24 hours. Just simply go back the next day and print them off. And add these to your packet.

Pack Test

There is also the requirement of a work capacity test or pack test, that you must be able to pass. It requires a 3-mile walk in under 45 minutes while wearing a 45-pound weight vest.
